INTRODUCTION

This was a Tabletop Exercise for the AzCHER Western Region members interested in participating in a TTX. Attendees were from facilities throughout the Western Region including 8 organizations represented. Administration, nursing, maintenance, social work, 16 in all (see attached roster). A PPT was presented briefly covering components of the Nursing Home Incident Command System (NHICS) and the roles/responsibilities of each position. Assessing the situation, establishing objectives, and considering what an operational period is. The scenario was presented in 3 modules. Module 1, participants were provided information that northern and southern Az were experiencing unprecedented wildfires. Attendees were given time to contemplate a plan of action with the information provided up to this point, asking participants to consider the steps on establishing objectives if, who, when they might consider evacuating residents from their facilities. Module 2 introduced the fact that 100+ residents in Western Az need to be evacuated to the Phoenix area and ADHS was asking for assistance from the LTC community to take in displaced residents. Discussion followed, regarding steps to be taken to help. Module 3, buses and 5 (unexpected) ambulances arrive at YOUR facility unplanned/requested. The group was asked what steps they would take to address this situation.

AFTER ACTION REPORT OVERVIEW

This report is a compilation of information from participants working in long term care facilities across Flagstaff and Western Arizona area. The presentation was intended to provide a semi complex incident for attendees to share policies and procedures related to dealing with behavioral residents, considering infectious disease and the possibility of evacuating their facilities. The pre- ttx session covered the NHICS as well as the roles and responsibilities of the ICS command team and provide information to assist attendees focus on establishing objectives and operational periods. Several attendees were new to the TTX process and dealing with emergent issues. All participants offered valuable insight as to how to deal with issues presented and how they might fit in. The participation and input from the coalition representative provided valuable insight as to how AzCHER might fit in to this particular type of situation

The recommendations in this AAR should be viewed with considerable attention to creating and maintaining a culture of safety and collaboration while providing the care to residents and staff during emergencies. Each person should review the recommendations and determine the most appropriate action and time needed for implementation.

The issues outlined in this AAR will be addressed in the Improvement Plan and will list corrective actions to complete. The Improvement Plan will serve as a summary of the AAR and as a guide for corrective action over the course of the following year's training program for staff.
